Prehistoric puppets and models


Choose a hand puppet or models of dinosaurs and other

Primary Science resources from ABPI

The Edina Trust Science Grant Scheme can provide just that! Schools in eleven areas around the UK are entitled to non-competitive grants accessible via a quick and simple application process. check back soon as the scheme is brought to new areas every school year. Schools choose how best to use their grant:

- Is hands-on science equipment a priority?
- A science visit in or out of school?
- The development of a school garden?
- The purchase of

a *Primary Science* subscription? From May 2018 the Trust approves the use of its funding to purchase primary school membership of the ASE, which includes a subscription to *Primary Upd8* – a range of downloadable science activities that use topical events to create exciting science lessons.
